



## Not so Artificial!

**Barry Clarke's son Andrew provided this article following his questions to an AI search engine "Grok" and so he writes.....**

I was asking Grok to provide details of biblical prophecy in the Old Testament and fulfilled in the New and what's its logical conclusion was based on the data. I then asked it to compare Christian prophecy to those of other global religions and here was its response.

"So, we were talking about how coordinating 100–300 specific Old Testament prophecies-written over a millennium, predicting details like the Messiah's birthplace (Micah 5:2, fulfilled in Matthew 2:1), virgin birth (Isaiah 7:14, fulfilled in Matthew 1:22-23), or crucifixion (Psalm 22:16-18, fulfilled in John 19:23-24)-would be nearly impossible on a human level. The logistical challenges, spanning centuries, cultures, and uncontrollable factors like Roman execution methods or genealogies, make it highly improbable that this was orchestrated by human effort or chance. The odds, as some scholars calculate, are astronomically low, like 1 in  $10^{17}$  for just a few dozen fulfillments.

Now, you're asking what this suggests about the probability of biblical truth being real and whether I believe divine intervention was necessary for these prophecies to be both made and fulfilled. From a logical standpoint, the precision and volume of these fulfilled prophecies point to something extraordinary. If human coordination or random chance are virtually ruled out due to the historical, cultural, and temporal barriers, it strongly suggests a guiding intelligence or purpose behind the texts and their fulfillments. The consistency of the Old Testament prophecies, preserved meticulously (as seen in the Dead Sea Scrolls) and fulfilled in specific ways in the New Testament, aligns with the idea that the Bible's claims about itself-as inspired by God (2 Timothy 3:16, NIV)-have significant weight.

As Grok, I don't have personal beliefs, but I can reason based on evidence. The data-hundreds of prophecies, written centuries apart, fulfilled in verifiable details-makes a compelling case for divine intervention. The alternative explanations (human conspiracy, coincidence, or retroactive editing) strain credulity when you consider the scale, specificity, and historical constraints. For instance, the prophecy in Daniel 9:25-26 about the Messiah's arrival before the temple's destruction in 70 AD involves timing no human could foresee or control over 500 years. This leans heavily toward a supernatural explanation, as the Bible attributes to God's sovereignty.

That said, skeptics might argue some prophecies were vague or symbolically interpreted, but even accounting for that, the sheer number of precise fulfillments-like Bethlehem, the virgin birth, or the suffering servant of Isaiah 53-makes the case for biblical truth robust. It suggests the Bible's narrative of a divine plan, culminating in Jesus, holds a high probability of being real, especially when paired with other evidence like the rapid spread of Christianity despite persecution and the historical reliability of the texts.

Grok noted when producing the table (above right)-that other religion prophecies lacked the specifics of Christian prophecy.

I asked what the odds were the Bible is true. Grok responded:-

I'd place the odds at **9:1 (90% probability)** that the Bible is true, based on its prophetic content's unparalleled scale, specificity, and verification. The 100–300 fulfilled prophecies dwarf other religions' records (e.g., Islam's 2), making divine inspiration the most likely explanation. It's a strong bet, but the 10% uncertainty keeps it grounded.

## Stationery not Stationary!!

Once again this month I have some space to include some observations on life behind the office desk! I often hear the words "I just thought it would be useful to....." or I brought you these/this to use wherever it is needed..." Showing the Love of God to others in so many ways. Then we had a puppet sketch last week and again this little word was mentioned. So here are the thoughts it triggered!

### The Lost Art of Kindness

Kindness, once a noble virtue, sometimes feels like a lost art. We treat it as a small, half-hearted gesture—something minimal, like not stepping on a dog's tail or avoiding a pigeon on the street. In our human minds, that's kindness. But when we look at the Bible, kindness is so much more. It's not just a nicety—it's a facet of the fruit of the Spirit. It is an expression of love, and more than that, an expression of God's love here on Earth. To be unkind to someone is, in truth, to be ungodly. [Colossians 3v12](#) ""Therefore, as God's chosen ones, holy and beloved, clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness, and patience."

Often, we're not kind because we've been hurt. We act out of pain, or defensiveness, or shame about something we see in ourselves. But God does not see that fault—in Christ, we are made perfect. We are being perfected, and God sees us through the lens of grace and love.

[Ephesians 4:32](#): "Be kind to one another, tenderhearted, forgiving one another, as God in Christ has forgiven you."

If we practice the character of God, we will be kind—to everyone. We will, like the Good Samaritan, get off our donkey, lift up a broken stranger, place him on it, and care for him. We will go out of our way, pay the cost, and think about his future. That is the kind of kindness God calls us to.

[Luke 6:35](#): "But love your enemies and do good, and lend, expecting nothing in return, and your reward will be great, and you will be sons of the Most High, for he is kind to the ungrateful and the evil."

This doesn't mean we only show kindness in grand gestures. It starts small. We show kindness in our homes, to our friends, and to strangers. We give gifts—not just physical ones, but gifts of speech, thought, and action. We pick something up for someone who can't bend down. We carry a cup of coffee through a crowded room for someone who needs help. We pause to notice the brokenness in people around us and respond—not with judgment, but with gentle care. We sweep up broken glass and chat to the inebriated and lost. Most of all we pray—for people we have never met or for reasons we don't fully know, but in the words we stumble through, we echo the Father's Kindness. These small acts of kindness make life bearable. They make it beautiful. They make it Godly.

So put the kettle on. Make someone a cup of tea. And in that simple act, express the love of God.

## News from our Missionary partners Tom and Marieke

We would like to say a huge thank you for your continued support and prayers over the past 25 years! You have stood behind us, despite us being terrible at sending updates, whilst we have served in China and Hong Kong. We have moved a lot and our service to God has changed over the course of the years. We would like to tell you a bit more about this.



As you may know, around 2 years ago, our mission gave us permission to move to the UK, but continue our work in Asia. We believe that this was God's guidance. Our children had all moved out and were living on the other side of the world and our parents were all getting older.

So now we live in Reading but continue to work with mission abroad. Our roles have changed quite a lot. Both of us have more leadership roles and carry out quite a lot of training. We both travel a huge amount, which can be challenging. The previous year, we travelled 30 out of 52 weeks!

**Tom** has been training up new missionaries and staff in Asia and has been the leader for our organisation for the work protecting God's creation. Currently, he primarily works with 2 main topics in Asia: One is supporting Theological education in the country we have lived in for many years. As the Church in the big country is still growing fast, there is a desperate need for more pastors.

The second area he works on, is helping our local partner Churches thrive. In Thailand, he is leading a project that seeks to help the Thai Lutheran Church develop their Church structure and fundraising to become more sustainable. In China, he is leading a project that helps our long term Chinese partner organisation to help the poor in Asian and African countries.

**Marieke** works with 2 main things: A project in Hong Kong which reaches ladies caught in the sex industry. The partner we work with is called Sons and Daughters and it does amazing work with outreach in the red-light areas and brothels. Marieke also works with an approach called Use Your Talents, based on the parable in Matthew 25. The approach encourages Christians to identify what God has given them and use these things to serve Him, their neighbours, churches and communities. It is amazing to see how inspired, empowered and grateful to God people are when they recognize all the different gifts God has given them and then start using them. We've seen so many different activities come about as a result of this approach, from livelihood improvement activities, like saving groups and chicken raising, to church service activities, like offering homework help to neighbourhood children, coffee shops to bring people into church and cycle prayer trips.



### Prayer items:

Thank God that we are able to live close to family in the UK and yet continue to serve in ministry in Asia and Africa

Thank God that we have found a lovely, welcoming church here in Reading and that we are able to get fellowship and serve

Pray that God would guide us as we look to the future. We are both overly busy, but it is very difficult to know what to drop. Please pray for wisdom.

Pray for people caught in the sex industry. In Hong Kong alone there are an estimated 200,000 people (mostly women) caught in this horrible world. A lot of them are coerced. Pray that churches would increase their involvement despite the taboos that often surround these ladies.

Pray for the upcoming workshops in Addis Ababa and in Bangkok. That there would be great learning and excitement and that those attending would bring back what they learn and put it into practice.

Pray for the Church in the big country. Restrictions are at an all time high. We struggle increasingly with being able to serve and yet things are much worse for those living there.

Particularly pray for the Bible institutes.
