Kingdom-Shaped Workplace

Your will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Matthew 6:10

Victorian factories were dark places. Fatalities were high, and workers often lived in poverty. "How can the working man cultivate ideals," George Cadbury asked, "when his home is a slum?" And so he built a new kind of factory for his expanding chocolate business, one that benefited his workers. The result was Bournville, a village of more than three hundred homes with sports fields, playgrounds, schools and churches for Cadbury's workers and their families. They were paid good wages and offered medical care, all because of Cadbury's faith in Christ.

Jesus teaches us to pray for God's will to be done "on earth as it is in heaven" (Matthew 6:10). This prayer can help us imagine, as Cadbury did, what our workplaces would be like under God's rule, where our "daily bread" is earned and our "debtors" forgiven (vv. 11–12). As employees, it means working with "all your heart . . . for the Lord" (Colossians 3:23). As employers, it means giving staff what's "right and fair" (4:1). Whatever our role, whether paid or voluntary, it means tending to the wellbeing of those we serve with.

Like George Cadbury, let's imagine how things could be different if God were in charge of our neighbourhoods and workplaces. Because when He is, people flourish. (By Sheridan Voysey, for Our Daily Bread online message)

can offer some time to wrap and pack– all paper Sellotapé and goodies will be provided!



The Street Pastors Initiative was started Nationally by a lovely man called Les Isaacs. His heart went out to those who ended up in A&E each week basically due to the consumption of too much alcohol on a Friday or Saturday night. He heard the call to get church members out on the streets pastoring those who were in need. They keep folk safe with drinks of coffee and water and filling them up with sandwiches or handing out lollipops to top up their blood sugar level. In the case of those who had either lost their shoes or taken them off to be able to walk , then flip flops were provided.

Street Pastors started in Sittingbourne around 20 years ago with a Salvation Army leader called Dave Ramsay. Later it was headed up by our very own Thana Shanmugam until he moved away to Ashford. Then it was Andrew Lee, from HTSB. Over this period of time support had waned a little. Then came Covid19!

The servant heart of someone helping another to stay safe, to get home safely– especially Females, has raised the churches profile on many high streets– including Sittingbourne. Up until Covid the Street Pastors were well known to door/security staff. Kindness was extended to



them too- free hot chocolates and goodies at many of the café's and bars and a general appreciation for their fortitude- especially when the weather was grim!

In these times of drink spiking and coercion and theft of mobile phones etc the Street Pastors are needed more than ever. Now is the time for our Light to Shine before men and for us to have mercy on the broken. None of the Street Pastors are verbally preaching to those they help— in fact they are specifically warned

against being judgmental or critical. They are to offer help without any thought of being repaid. They have a mobile phone to call for taxis and will help anyone to get home safely. BUT- and this is a big but! The question comes back time and time again, "Why are you doing this?" People who realise they are in danger appreciate the kindness and the safety they offer. Many parents have sought out the Street Pastors and are so grateful that their son or daughter has been returned home safely that they want to give a donation or more importantly they want to hear more about the Street Pastors or the Churches they come from.

The Police have funds to give for Street Pastors as they recognise the fact that petty crime and some more serious assaults are reduced when the Street Pastors are on the High Street. So have a think! Could you sit in the Hub at SBC and pray whilst the Street Pastors are out on the High Street? Could you pick up on the training and become a Street Pastor? Could you donate towards uniform, lollies and flip flops?? We can all play some part in reaching out to the darker corners of the High Street and shining the Light of Christ as a beacon of Hope.

The Street Pastors team in Sittingbourne closed over the period of Covid19 and Andrew came to the realisation that they could not carry on without a full committee supporting the actual street teams. Also that there had to be a commitment from Churches Together in Sittingbourne to support and promote the work of the Street Pastors. It has taken some time to get a new committee—but that has happened, the finances had to be signed over. There is quite a Fund pot available for training and uniform and supporting the active teams. The Police are all in favour of SP restarting, the council are all in favour of SP restarting.

Notes from Limitless! Part Two– following on from the notes published in the September Magazine

Pruning

Why do gardeners prune? Maintain plant health/Control growth. Encourage production/Transform the shape/Rejuvenation/Protection.

Applying this to God's Action in our own lives:When in a season of pruning:
Promises – stand on promises in scripture.
Practicalities – acknowledge the season, build healthy rhythms, choose thankfulness, get support.
Preparation – strengthen roots for later.

Peace doesn't come from understanding, it comes from trusting.

<u>A Healthy relationship with an imperfect church - deconstruction</u> What creates your world view? Age, background, class, gender, race, life experiences, etc. Deconstruction – critical dismantling of traditions.

Why is there a spike in deconstruction? Loss of trust in large institutions and authority. More diverse and accessible world. Christians are burning out. Focus on conformity over unity.

Conformity or unity? Theologies can be 'in blood' (non-negotiable), 'in pen' (firm) or 'in pencil' (flexible).

How do we deal with deconstruction? Theological reflection: What is going on? What is the issue? Why is it going on? Why is it an issue? What should be going on? What does scripture say? How do we respond?

<u>The digital world</u> 5.35 billion internet users worldwide. 25% of 5-7 year olds (in the UK) have their own smartphone. 6.5 hours spent online every day on average. Self harm in girls increased 78% since 2010. Your phone changes your:

Identity and expression. Memory and cognitive ability. Physical presence and communication. Habits and behaviours.

Phones/digital world create:



Social deprivation – less time in person with friends. Sleep deprivation – quantity and quality. Attention fragmentation – constant notifications destroy ability to stay on task. Addiction – phones used in same way as slot machine gambling (dopamine hit) Consequences for well-being and relationships.

Where do we go from here? Reason in the synagogue, reason in the marketplace (go where the people are).

Use the tools but guard your heart. Be the master of your digital usage. Remember what the goal is.

At the nine day Cerebral Palsy camp Mina learnt that she is not alone and should not be excluded from activities and can fellowship with other parents . She's also now better equipped to care for Kamal and help him to have the best chance at developing and growing into all God has created him to be.

No matter how big or small our gift is the money can always be used to support others. So many countries live in poverty that our money goes a long way to helping others in need.
